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
And even though we're canceling the August meeting, we're determined to have one in October ... preferably at the Club Pheasant but if not, by Zoom. We'll be mostly

## "All in the Family"

A celebration of life will be held at the V.A. Hall in Folsom on Saturday, Sept. 4, from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. for **Mel Boyd,** who lived life to the fullest during his 74 years. Mel died of brain cancer on June 26.

Mel spent much of his career at KCRA/ 3, where he started out as a delivery driver in 1970 and worked his way up to being a star photographer (and world traveler) for the *Weeknight* show. After he left KCRA in 1983, he started his own production company doing features, films and commercials. A veteran of the Air Force in Vietnam, Mel always had an

interest in veterans' affairs. As a member of Vietnam Veterans of America, he created a video on You Tube to promote federal funding for victims of PTSD (from which Mel suffered). One of the projects closest to his heart was recording the stories of Air Force fighter pilots. Mel served on the VBL board for several years, starting in 2013, then left to devote his time to recording the pilots' stories while they were still living.

Mel earned his BA in communications from CSUS. In his infrequent spare time, he enjoyed rock-and-roll music, guitars, classic cars and serving his fellow veterans. He and his wife Linda shared 54 years of marriage and raised two daughters and a son; they had eight grandchildren and one great grandchild.

"A unique soul with a great personality and an amazing sense of humor, diligent and caring.".... words more likely to describe a saint than a TV news director, right? But those are the words used to describe the late **Fred Zehnder**, who died on June 27 at the age of 87. He was killed by a truck driver, believed to be under the influence, while taking his regular evening walk on the streets of Alameda.

Fred was one of those guys who took newscasting seriously, giving his reporters enough time to tell their stories and mentoring them while ... and after ... they worked for him. His most notable stint was as news director at

Oakland's KTVU from 1975 to 1999. Before that, he worked at KPIX, KOVR and KGO. After he left broadcasting, he stayed in journalism as the editor-in-chief of two Bay Area newspapers, the *San Leandro Times* and the *Castro Valley Forum*.

Speaking of long and distinguished careers, consider the case of Legend **Ward Koppel**, who retired on July 16 after 42 years in the business.

It all began in September 1975, when Ward started working at the campus radio station KUOP; he was graduated from UOP in 1979. In September of that year he was hired as production assistant on KCRA/3's *Weeknight* show. The next year, KCRA assigned him to create a 6:30 a.m. newscast. In September 1989, KOVR/13 hired him to produce

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and expand its 6:30 a.m. newscast and in December 2005 he began a 13-year stint at KXTV/10. At 10 he performed a number of duties, including running the assignment desk and producing.

He married co-worker **Cindy Nevils** in 1978. Cindy retired the same day as Ward after working at KCRA/3 as an editor and archivist. They have two children, son Adam, who's in IT for Workers Comp, and daughter Hillary, a director at KXTV/10. Their granddaughter Harper is currently unemployed, but she's only two years old. Give her time!

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A remarkable man will be remembered on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 19, at the Firehouse Courtyard in Sacramento. The service, delayed by the Covid pandemic, will honor **Lawrence** (Larry) Haskel Fein, who passed away on Sept. 23, 2020. Larry was the husband of Legend and former KCRA/3 photo journalist Anita Fein.

Larry was graduated from UCLA and passed the California Bar in 1967. Larry, Anita and son Aaron moved to Sacramento later that year; Larry went to work for the California Legislative Counsel Bureau. By January 1975, Larry was working up to 80 hours a week writing legal opinions and drafting bills during the era of Prop. 13. One morning he suffered chest pains while riding his bike to work. He was seen at a hospital ER and sent home with medication for muscle spasms. The pain continued and on the third visit to the ER an EKG revealed he had suffered a massive heart attack resulting in the death of onethird of the left ventricle of his heart.

Larry and his attorney sued the Permanente Medical Group for medical malpractice and prevailed. After ten years of appeals, the case was finally decided by the U. S. Supreme Court, and directly impacted the standard of care for chest pain management in emergency rooms throughout the U. S.

After healing from the heart attack, Larry returned to work at the Legislative Counsel Bureau on a three-quarter time basis. But ultimately, his damaged heart failed and he received a transplant in 1990. Unfortunately, the transplant failed and he had to undergo a second transplant in 1998. This one worked.

Despite his heart problems and damaged hips, Larry and wife Anita led an active life, seeing and enjoying much of the world and doing volunteer work.

As Anita puts it: "Larry's courage, his love of life and gentle kindness were an inspiration to all who knew him."

Larry is survived by his wife Anita, his sons Jordan and Aaron, and three grandchildren.

We would also like to mark the passing of local radio personality **Don Wright** in Roseville at the age of 72. He is



best remembered as the force behind the creation of KSFM Earth Radio 102 in 1974, competing with KZAP for the ears of thousands of young Sacramentans tuning in to underground FM radio. Don later worked at KSJO in San Jose as well as Sacramento stations KXOA, KNDE, KZAP, KGNR, KFBK, KROY, the Point, and KERS. And Don was an on-air talent at KNX-FM in Los Angeles and KCBS-FM San Francisco. More

recently it was a DJ on internet station Planet Pootwaddle, which calls itself, "Your Magic Brownie of the Airwaves."

Throughout his career, Don helped many youngsters get their start in broadcasting. One of these was a whippersnapper named **Rush Limbaugh** at KFBK. Don was the original producer/call screener for Rush's show until **Kitty O'Neal** came on board.
