Preserving Our Broadcast Memories

Our August program will feature Nicholas Piontek and Chad E. Williams from the Center for Sacramento History. The two historian/archivists will present a how-to on preserving audio, video, and photo collections for the benefit of researchers and future Sacramentans.

> Archivist Nicholas Piontek is an "Information professional obsessed with finding a better way by having a 'yes before no' mentality." Among his expert duties is developing procedures for processing, storing and keeping records of documentary materials. As well as representing the division before various community groups, potential donors, and individual researchers.

Nick is a recent Master of Science in Information graduate from the University of Michigan School of Information, where he specialized in Archives & Records Management, and previously earned his Bachelor of Arts in History from Michigan State University. While attending graduate school, he served as an elected officer of the student chapter of the Society of American Archivists, and then served as an elected board member for the Students and New Archival Professionals roundtable within the Society.

> The Center's Film Specialist, **Chad Williams**, is familiar to many of us because he and Legend Matías Bombal produced both the spectacular documentary Alhambra: Sacramento's Palace of Fantasy", as well as The Sacramento Picture! Vintage Film Clips of Our City and Our People. The later included highlights of a 1920 Sacramento Senators baseball game; the city's commercial and architectural core, J and K streets, and the redevelopment of the West End in the 1950s and 1960s. Both films included commentary from local experts and longtime citizens who provided insights into the history of our city and the everyday lives of Sacramentans before their stories were

lost forever. In a nod to Joni Mitchell's wisdom, Chad reflected on the Alhambra Theatre, "It was torn down long before I knew it existed

... They tore down paradise and put up a parking lot."

In related news, KCRA alum Steve LaRosa wrote Allen Chamberlin: 916/456-7654 an article urging broadcasters to preserve materials properly while citing Nicholas as a local archivist which stimulated this month's program. We reproduce it on the follow page.

Donating Old Footage to Preserve the Past

For those TV and radio folks who find their homes cluttered with boxes of their "greatest hits" and are looking for a solution to their domestic overcrowding, the Center for Sacramento History may just have the solution.

The Center houses a large collection of moving images in film, video, and digital formats. The largest portion comes from the KCRA-TV Film Collection [rescued by VBL member **Harry Sweet**] and the KOVR-TV Film Collection, both of which contain raw news footage and edited programs dating from the late 1950s. The Center is equipped to accept most audio, film, and video formats.

Many of those formats are such that you probably wouldn't be able to view them anyway, due to not having the suitable equipment. And it would be a shame for them to end up in a garbage dump someday when they could be saved for posterity and for use by future media producers as well as general historic research.

In order to better preserve its film holdings, the Center has recently completed construction of a cold storage room within the vault. The cold storage room will allow the Center to preserve its film holdings and buy valuable time to digitize the film without it decaying. Those interested may contact Nick Piontek

Zooming and Masking



like the Club Pheasant and the Buggy Whip no longer exist. Look at it


At our last meeting, we had some issues with Zoom, with so many of us having to put on different hats to make the meeting happen. The Zoom portion of the meeting was a disaster. I

Our own **Gary Gerould** is the much-deserving recipient of the highest honor bestowed by a chapter of the National Association of Television Arts and Sciences. At the Northern California chapter's annual awards gala in San Francisco on June 11, Gary was honored with the Governors' Award.

Gary has been traveling the globe as a sportscaster for television and radio for an amazing 64 years. Starting in broadcasting in his hometown of Midland, Michigan at the age of 14, Gerould has logged 1900-hundred network telecasts for NBC, ABC, and ESPN.

He's the voice of the NBA's Sacramento Kings and has been doing playby-play for them since the team's arrival in Sacramento in 1985. To date, he's called 26-hundred games. Simultaneously, for 37 years, Gary was a



motor sports reporter for ABC and ESPN. Gerould also spent eight-years covering NFL Football.

Gary has done a little bit of everything when it comes to covering sports, from Sumo wrestling to the Olympics. He has a special enthusiasm for Northern California motor sports, donating time, energy, and money to preserve the rich history of various tracks like the Calistoga Speedway.

At age 78, "G-man" says he has no plans of retiring.


100 Years of KFBK

John Jervis: 1933-2022

Legend and former KCRA reporter **John Jervis** died in his sleep the morning of June 8. A graduate of UC Berkeley, John served in the US Navy, where he was the director of the closed-circuit television station aboard the aircraft carrier *USS Kearsarge*. After a brief stint as a reporter for KCBS radio in San Francisco, John settled in at KCRA, first for the radio station, then moving over to the TV side. He covered the 1960 Winter Olympics, and then ran the KCRA Capitol Bureau. In 1971, he left KCRA and worked for the Senate Democratic Caucus, Senator George Moscone, and the state controller's office. John next joined the private sector, working in public relations and consulting. He retired in 1998.



John enjoyed camping trips to Lake Tahoe and Santa Cruz, community outreach activities with his church, Elderhostel trips and especially golf with his friends, a past-time he engaged in until the final weeks of his life.

Memorial services were held July 23 at St. Michael's Episcopal Church in Carmichael. He is survived by his wife of almost 65 years, Sally Reid Jervis, two daughters and one son, two grandsons and one great-grandson.
